

### **Blessed Peter To Rote**

Blessed Peter To Rote (pronounced "toe rote") was born in 1912 in Papua New Guinea to a chieftain and his wife who were converts to Catholicism. His father taught him the faith and sent him to the mission school. Refusing to allow Peter to become a priest, Peter's father encouraged him to study to become a catechist. After three years of study, Peter began his ministry at the age of 21. He went on to marry and had three children. When the Japanese occupied the Pacific islands during WWII, Peter continued teaching in secret but was caught, beaten, and imprisoned. His wife begged him to give up being a catechist, but Peter refused. His leadership and teaching strengthened the people to remain true to their faith despite intense pressure from the occupying forces. Peter was eventually executed via lethal injection and given a chief's burial in the new cemetery next to the church where he had ministered. Even though many people came, the funeral was held in silence out of fear of the soldiers.

Blessed Peter was beatified by St. John Paul II on January 17th, 1995.

# **CHALLENGE OF THE WEEK** by Dan Harms

#### "So, we're becoming Catholic!"

I walked into the Saint Bridget Middle School Performing Arts Center last Sunday to set up the stage for a week of Vacation Bible School and ran into a couple I didn't recognize. They were crafting beautiful seven and a half foot palm trees out of wood, paper, and chicken wire - the set looked incredible. They had been building all weekend and were clearly having fun doing it. I introduced myself and told them I worked at Saint Bridget, to which they responded: "Oh, we're not Catholic. But we've just started the process to become Catholic!"

Since moving to Richmond over 20 years ago, they had been members of a Baptist congre-

gation. Their children are grown and the wife, now working as a nanny, intersected with a parish family who was baptizing one of their children. The couple attended the baptism together and seemed to know that God was calling them home to the Catholic Church.

"Once we made that decision we wanted to get involved at the church as soon as we could - volunteers were needed for VBS, so here we are!"

They have joined our OCIA program (Order of Christian Initiation for Adults) and are in the phase of inquiry into the Catholic faith.

God is constantly calling us closer to him and nowhere is God more intimately close to us than in the Eucharist and the sacraments God gives us through the Catholic Church.

We never know where, when, or how God will lead us closer to himself, but the willingness and openness of this couple to say "yes" was absolutely inspiring.

Your challenge this week—be open to how God is leading you to himself and be bold enough to invite others along for the journey.

#### **About the Work**

The Virgin Mary, crowned with stars, stands above the world in the glory of heaven while crushing the serpent carrying the bitten fruit of original sin. Peter Paul Rubens, a German, painted this while spending a year in Spain. The work hangs in Madrid's Prado Museum.

### Today's Gospel

The seventy-two returned rejoicing, and said, "Lord, even the demons are subject to us because of your name." Jesus said, "I have observed Satan fall like lightning from the sky. Behold, I have given you the power to 'tread upon serpents' and scorpions and upon the full force of the enemy and nothing will harm you. Nevertheless, do not rejoice because the spirits are subject to you, but rejoice because your names are written in heaven."



Today's Gospel begins immediately after the final verse in last Sunday's Gospel. After strong language about the difficulties of discipleship, Jesus immediately appoints 72 people to go ahead of him to every town and place he plans to visit, proclaiming that the Kingdom of God is at hand. He sends them in pairs. In the Law of Moses two witnesses were needed for a testimony to be credible. It was probably also a safer way to travel. Jesus admits it will be difficult, that he is sending them out like lambs among wolves. Yet they are to bring nothing with them, not even a money bag or sandals. They are to greet no one on the

way so as not to be distracted from their mission. When they enter a house, their message is simply "peace." The response they will receive may be positive or negative. Either way, they are to know that the Kingdom of God is at hand. They are not to demand special treatment but eat and drink whatever is given them. They are to stay in one house and are not to look around for one that provides better accommodations. They are to heal the sick as a sign that the Kingdom of God is at hand for them. Like Jesus' miracles, healing is a sign of the coming of the kingdom. If the town will not receive them, they are to shake the dust

from their feet and move on. Even in the case of such rejection they should know that the Kingdom of God is at hand. When they return from their journeys, they are rejoicing because their mission has been successful. Demons were under their power because of Jesus' name. Jesus may have sent them out as lambs among wolves, but at the conclusion of this passage he assures them that they have been given power over the enemy and nothing will harm them, not even serpents and scorpions.



The physical imposition of hands is a critical part of Apostolic Succession, the means by which authority has been handed down from Jesus to the Apostles to the Bishops, Priests, and Deacons of today. A diocesan priests' ministry is an extension of the ministry of the Bishop.
